

This voyage tells the story of Polynesia and uncovers its history and legends as we sail through the South Seas and visit the captivating islands learning more of man and nature in this wonderful corner of the world, each shaping the destiny of the other. The name Polynesia means 'many islands' and no one could argue with the suitability of this title. There are islands of low lying coral with some of the most beautiful beaches in the world and contrasting volcanic mountainous landscapes of lush, incomparable beauty.

This is the ideal opportunity to explore this paradise on a leisurely passage to a corner of the world which has lured adventurers and romantics alike ever since Magellan first sailed to these

waters in 1521. The natural beauty of the islands is mesmerising, and on the more remote islands, villages are still composed of thatched houses, set amongst the shade of the breadfruit and coconut trees. Many islands are important nesting grounds for seabirds and sea turtles and the lagoons are breeding grounds for countless species of fish.

Our exploration begins and ends in Tahiti, the iconic island of the Pacific dream. Envision if you will the evocative paintings of Paul Gauguin, a Paris stockbroker who ditched it all to pursue his art in Tahiti. Gauguin's images of exuberant outdoor settings with vivid lagoons and statuesque palms will become the backdrop of your first days in paradise. From Tahiti, we fly to beautiful Hiva Oa where we will begin our voyage around the Marquesas Islands, an archipelago of enchanting volcanic isles, vibrant tropical flora and breathtaking coral reefs and explore the spectacular and little-visited atolls of the Tuamotu Archipelago with its pristine beaches and unique underwater world.

With the fleet of Zodiac landing craft we will explore inlets, lagoons and land in otherwise inaccessible places and although we set sail with a set itinerary, it is often the unscheduled events that become the highlight. Your experience will be made all the more memorable by the onboard team of experts who will accompany you on the Zodiacs, hold daily lectures and briefings and lead guided walks ashore.







JOINING YOU ON BOARD

One of the most important aspects of expedition cruising is the knowledge of the expert expedition team that accompanies you on board and for the forays ashore. With over 50 years of exploring, Lindblad Expedition's veteran staff and the quality of companionship they provide has established the company's reputation. Joining you on board the National Geographic Orion will be a team of naturalists, one expert per 10 guests, who provide talks, guidance ashore, and daily camaraderie. - Experience warm, heartfelt welcomes from island residents and visit ancient maraes (sacred sites).
- Taste local foods and connect with Marquesans during a cultural dance performance.
- On jungle hikes, be on the lookout for birds including endangered ultramarine lorikeet, zebra doves, manikins, and fairy terns.
- Explore one of the world's largest groups of coral atolls and their incredible blue lagoons via kayak, Zodiac, or stand-up paddleboard.
- Dive and snorkel in an extraordinary undersea world of manta rays, green sea turtles, and vast schools of pelagic fish from the clear, turquoise waters of the Tuamotus to the deep, nutrient rich seas of the Marquesas.











The Itinerary

Day 1 London to Los Angeles, USA. Fly by scheduled flight to Los Angeles and transfer to your onward flight to Tahiti.

Day 2 Tahiti, French Polynesia. Arrive in Papeete this morning and transfer to our hotel for an overnight stay. The remainder of your day is at leisure.

Day 3 Tahiti to Hiva Oa. This morning depart early from the hotel for the airport for the direct flight to Hiva Oa Island where you will transfer to the National Geographic Orion for embarkation. The rest of the morning is at leisure where you can relax on board or explore the town of Atuona. This afternoon settle into life on board and set sail.

Day 4 to 8 Marquesas Islands. We will spend the next five days exploring the Marquesan Islands of Tahuata, Nuku Hiva, Ua Huka and Fatu Hiva. Accompanied by our team of local guides, we will visit remote island villages to learn about religious rites, see ancient petroglyphs, witness spectacular dance performances at a Marquesan ma'ae, sample local goods in the villages and peruse unique arts and crafts. There will be an opportunity to attend a local church service with beautiful music, or hike up a valley with naturalists and local guides in search of rare birds and spectacular views. From Zodiacs and kayaks marvel at the rugged silhouettes of these legendary islands or dive below the surface with plenty of snorkelling opportunities to see the colourful and spectacular undersea world.

Day 9 At Sea. Enjoy a relaxing day at sea and attend some talks by the expedition team.

Day 10 Takaroa Atoll. Today will be the first of two days of exploration of the Tuamotu Archipelago. Our first stop will be Takaroa Atoll, a remote island nearly 350 miles from Tahiti. We will visit the main village, meet with the local people and learn about life on the island. There will be opportunities to snorkel or dive the stunning healthy reefs or walk pristine beaches lined with coconut palms.

Day 11 Rangiroa, Tuamotus. The atoll of Rangiroa is a ring of slender islands known for some of the best snorkelling and diving in French Polynesia. The turquoise lagoon at its centre is the second largest in the world. There will be plenty of opportunity to explore the rich underwater world hoping to see some of its large schools of pelagic fish, manta rays, dolphins and sea turtles.

Day 12 Tahiti to London. This morning we will arrive into Papeete where you can choose to visit the downtown area or central market. Disembark in

the afternoon and check into a hotel where rooms have been reserved in advance of our evening flight. Transfer to the airport for the scheduled indirect flight back to London.

Day 14 London. Arrive today.

NATIONAL GEOGRAPHIC ORION



Operated by our associates at Lindblad Expeditions, the state-of-the-art National Geographic Orion serves as a luxurious base from which to explore the far-flung corners of the world. A fully stabilised, ice-class vessel, the National Geographic Orion is at home navigating polar ice as well as small harbours in Europe or island hopping in the Pacific. The ship accommodates 102 guests in 53 cabins and is equipped with kayaks and Zodiac landing craft, diving and snorkelling gear, and sophisticated video equipment that allows access to the underwater world.



Your Cabin

Cabins aboard the National Geographic Orion are an inviting place to end your day of activity. There are a total of 53 outside cabins on board and each one features two portholes, an oval window, window or French balcony. In each cabin, beds can be twin or converted to a queen. Cabins range in size from 16.2 to 32 square metres and feature modern bathrooms, climate controls, hairdryer, Wi-Fi connections and USB ports for mobile devices. Category 6 suites benefit from a bathtub as well as a shower. You will find organic botanical products in the bathroom.

Your Dining

The restaurant features international cuisine inspired by the ports of call and all meals are served in a single seating with unassigned tables meaning you can dine with whomever you wish. The expedition team will dine alongside guests allowing for opportunities to discuss the highlights of the day and what is to come. The onboard chefs use fresh, local ingredients whenever possible, including locally grown produce, sustainably caught fish, and other local products. An array of fresh fruits and delicious fresh juices are key components of the breakfast buffet, as are fresh vegetables and fish at lunch and dinner. When conditions allow, lighter options may be served outside in the Outdoor Café on the Observation Deck A selection of house wine and alcoholic drinks are served with lunch and dinner and are included from the Bar. There is a 24-hour self service beverage station available for tea, coffee and soft drinks.

Your Space


The spacious public areas include the main dining room and the comfortable lounge which features wrap-around windows for optimal views, a full-service bar and state-of-the-art presentation facilities. The lounge is where guests gather daily for talks and recaps. There is also a small reference library with board games. Outside there is a partially covered and furnished sundeck with tables, chairs and lounge chairs for relaxing. To ease the embarkation and disembarkations for the daily activities, the vessel features a mudroom with lockers to store boots and other expedition gear. Another feature of the ship is the spa and fitness centre staffed by the wellness specialist. There is a shop on board stocked with local artisan products. Internet access, laundry service and a medical professional are available on board and there is a lift which serves all decks.

Life On Board

The atmosphere on board is relaxed and informal and focused on the marvellous scenery and wildlife we will be experiencing. Whilst sailing, you can relax on deck with a good book, spend time with the onboard specialists looking for wildlife, relax with a massage in the spa, take part in some morning stretches on deck with the wellness specialist or scan the horizon from the open Bridge with the binoculars provided on board. The vessel carries expedition equipment including eight Zodiac landing craft, kayaks, paddleboards, snorkelling equipment and an underwater video camera. An undersea specialist, a National Geographic photography expert and a photography instructor are part of every expedition team.




NATIONAL GEOGRAPHIC ORION DECK PLAN




BRIDGE DECK


